**MEMORIES BY THE LATE HARRY HOE KINDLY SHARED BY HIS
SON, CHRIS HOE**

I am Mr Harry Hoe. I live down Station Road, Ottringham, and the date is 15 April 1988. It is raining and it is one of the coldest Easters on record. I am going to begin in the year 1933. We lived down Sunk Island Road, in a row of cottages near the Coates House Farm. In the year 1933 my father married. My mother died in 1928 and father married again.

At that time there were businesses in Ottringham, there were 4 blacksmiths – Chadwick, Foster, Calvert and Giles. They also had 2 or 3 thrashing sets. There were 2 cobblers who both lived in the Main Street – Pawson and Johnson. There were 2 grocery shops – Mr Drewery and Mrs Munday, one at each end of the street. James Wright had a tailor's shop in the middle of the street and he lived with his sister and she used to have a small sweet shop and tobacco... There was also Mooks the butcher which was situated at far end of the street, and behind was a bit of spare ground and then Ottringham School.

Mr John Young was the Headmaster and Mrs Ramskir was the Infant Teacher. There were probably about 70 or 80 children at that time going to school, and it was a Church of England school and has been pulled down. There is a bungalow now on the site where it was. Both his sons were in the 2nd World War. The daughter married Les Spooner from Hull.

I, er we, joined the choir when I was about 11 years old. There were 40 people in the choir at the time. Special occasions, flower services and Easter Sunday the Church was absolutely packed. There was standing room only. We used to go to Church 3 times on a Sunday, morning service, Sunday School in the afternoon and Evensong at night.

On a Thursday it was choir practice night. The only means of heating in the Church was a big coke stove at the end, which had to be stoked up and kept going all Saturday night and Sunday to keep the Church something like warm.

There was no electricity only paraffin lamps, and I think the piped water came into the village 1933 – 34 time. I remember it coming in and electricity would come in round about the same time or shortly after. Everybody had paraffin lamps and candles for light; there was no wireless whatsoever.

Both sides of the Main Street were cobbled stones and I remember once there was a bus came from Withernsea to Hull, open topped bus with a lot of people on it – men and women that stopped at Watts Arms for a drink, beer or whatever.

Times were very hard in those days, you don't realize until you get a bit older like how things were. Nobody had any money and there was nothing of entertainment whatsoever. You had to make your own entertainment. There was a billiard room and snooker room at the old Institute, where people had concerts and the men used to go and play billiards or snooker or play cards or whatever.

In those days before there were any motor cars and lorries there were 2 village carriers. One was Bob Wright who lived near The White Horse on the Main Road. He had a horse and rully and he used to go into Hull Tuesdays and Fridays and bring goods back for the shops, and for anybody who asked him to bring a parcel of anything he'd bring it.

The other one was Mr Drewery. He lived down Sunk Island Road, in Church House, but he had a little wagon, a very ld one. It only carried about 3cwt, if that, and there was also Mr Denton-Beal who lived up Station Road in the house called Gilgal. He had a lorry. He'd take a few pigs and such like. His mother had the other pub. While we are in the White Horse area of the village, the garage that is there now – Mr Calvert's, was a blacksmith's shop and he lived in the house, Spring Villas, what has recently been a nursing home for older people, and next to where Mr Bob Wright, the carrier lived there was Mr Eastwood. He had his business up White Horse Lane. He was a plumber and local watch mender and he used to mend all the local watches and clocks and things, and he used to look after the Church clock.

Now you go up Station Road, there was a yard down there where Bramblewick bungalow is at the moment, which was a yard for thrashing machines. There was a chap called Cornswaite, he had 3 thrashing machines in that yard.

Next to it, Fir Stone bungalow where Mrs Middleton lives, it was a 'kek' yard where they used to take all fallen stock and boiled 'em up and such like. It used to belong to Mr Pickering. There was also a fell monger's yard belonging to Mr Harry Smith which was next to Church House. He lived in the house what backed up to the Church yard and the yard was just opposite, quite a big yard it was. He used to take all fallen stock you know from all these farms, you know a lot of dead stock on farms in those days 'cos every farm was a big farm, cereals and stock.

In the Main Street what is the Post Office today, used to be the fish and chip shop. It was owned by Mr and Mrs Pawson. Mr Pawson used to work for a Mr Pickering who had the fell monger's yard up Station Road. The Post Office was a couple of doors down from the existing Post Office and there was two Miss Gibsons who ran the Post Office in them days, and there was Mr Jock Gibson he was the Postman for Sunk Island and Mr Rob Gibson, he was the Postman for Halsham. He also had a smallholding and dairy farm next to the Day School. He used to keep about 12 or 14 cows and his son Harry and his daughter Gertie used to carry, hawk the milk round the village in big 2 gallon cans, and pint cans what 'av yer to each household. That was the only way of getting milk in those days, there was no bottles. There was a Billany who lived up Sunk Island Road but he kept a dozen cows. He, they used to deliver milk round the village as well.

Mrs Pawson, who had the fish shop, it was her father who lived across the road opposite to her who was the cobbler. His nick name was 'Gobbie' Pawson. His little shop was a meeting place for all the old fellows in the village who'd finished work. They used to go in there and sit playing dominoes and such like in the winter time. It was warm in there, he had a small coke stove, they all used to sit round playing dominoes and such games.
